From the tower, the "Jurats" governed Saint-Émilion's Jurisdiction since the 13th century. Nowadays, the "Jurade" is the wine brotherhood of Saint-Émilion. Each year, on the third weekend of september, the "Jurats" go to the top of the tower and announce the opening of harvest season. The day ends with a great banquet. The gastronomy vocabulary has changed a lot since the Middle Ages. Find the medieval words in the word search grid and find their definition.

One letter is missing. Which one is it?







