It aims to strike a balance between the three pillars of sustainable development in the production and realization of tourism activities.

In line with sustainable development, ecotourism was defined in 1992 by the International Ecotourism Society as "a form of responsible travel in natural areas that contributes to the protection of the environment and the well-being of local populations".



Cyclotowtism A




Cycle touring is an outdoor sport that excludes any notion of competition. It is accessible to all, regardless of age, gender, physical ability or time. As defined by the Fédération Française de Cyclotourisme, it integrates 3 essential components: sporthealth, tourism and culture.

This route offers the freedom to experience simple, essential pleasures, to make a lot of historical and heritage discoveries, to fulfill a quest for well-being and reconnection...

In Gironde, the 180 km itinerary crosses the Libournais, Entre-Deux-Mers, Bordeaux and Sud Gironde regions.

ECO-LABELED ESTABLISHMENTS

In the Grand Saint-Emilionnais area, many tourist establishments have been awarded an environmental certification.

With its **European Ecolabel label**, the 5-star establishment combines luxury and sustainable development: 100% renewable energy, local suppliers and service providers, staff awareness of daily eco-actions...



Committed to a sincere approach in their restaurant **l'Huitrier Pie**, the two chefs implement daily actions: local producers, a kitchen garden of flowers and aromatic herbs, fresh seasonal produce... These actions have earned them the **green food** certification.







The Michelin-starred restaurant Les Belles Perdrix, located in the heart of the Troplong Mondot vineyards, has been committed to ecosystem sustainability for several years: vegetable gardens and orchards cultivated according to permaculture principles, responsible waste and water management, and working with suppliers committed to reusable containers. As a result, it was awarded a Michelin Green Star.

The Grand Saint-Émilionnais area winegrowing estates are actively committed to ecology, adopting environmentally-friendly practices to preserve biodiversity and soil quality. This ecological transition reflects their desire to combine tradition and innovation to produce wines of excellence while protecting the environment for future generations.

certifications you may come across when organising your trip



Organic farming is a method of agricultural production whose purpose is to respect natural balances and have a minimal impact on the environment. It is based on farming practices which are inspired by natural processes and exclude the use of synthetic chemical products, such as pesticides and herbicides, as well as genetically modified organisms (GMOs).



The Biodyvin certification is issued by the Syndicat International des Vignerons de Culture Bio-Dynamique. It certifies that the wines have been produced using biodynamic farming practices, a holistic method of cultivation that aims to enhance the health of the soil, the plant and the surrounding ecosystem.



Founded in 1928, the Demeter certification is an international brand for products derived from biodynamic agriculture.

VISIT LA ROSE AT CHÂTEAU LA ROSE POURRET



SAINT-ÉMILION MACAROONS

Saint-Emilion macaroons are part of a culinary heritage that dates back to 1620. Born in the expert hands of the Ursuline nuns at the local convent, these sweet little treats have survived the centuries, carefully preserving their manufacturing secrets. Far from the classic French macaroons, Saint-Émilion macaroons are distinguished by their soft, dense texture, the result of a very special manufacturing technique.



LAMPREY FROM BORDEAUX: A GASTRONOMIC SPECIALITY EMBLEMATIC

Lamprey, a fish with tender flesh and a delicate flavour, is prepared using traditional techniques that enhance its taste. CRÉMANT DE BORDEAUX IN SAINT-ÉMILION

In the heart of the city, Crémant de Bordeaux (white or rosé wine) has been produced since the 19th century under the Tour du Roy, in the Caves de la Tour du Roy, in the dark underground quarries of the former Franciscan monastery, in the Cloître des Cordeliers, and in the Lateyron cellars in Montagne.

ECO-RESPONSIBLE MEANS OF TRANSPORT


Employees who are able to do so undertake to carpool or use alternative modes of transport.
